As anticipated, there is a strong role for heritage within the proposals, which include:

THEME 2 *Connection and cohesion* - Using heritage to create a sense of place:


- ◆ Develop heritage assets in and around the village to tell the story of Coalburn
- ◆ Bring local people and groups together to develop interpretation displays and exhibitions and tell their own stories

THEME 5 *Putting Coalburn on the map* - Promoting our heritage:

- ◆ Develop natural and industrial heritage interpretation in and around Coalburn including well marked heritage trails, interpretive boards, and signed landmarks
- ◆ Explore the possibility of creating a memorial sculpture and a more visible 'wee museum' for visitors within the village
- ◆ Support volunteers to develop digital resources and online promotion.

Amanda Davis, Development Worker at the Miners' Welfare One Stop Shop, will be at our 4th October meeting to tell us more about the Action Plan.


'At the Crossroads of Time - how a small Scottish village changed history'



This wide ranging book about Lesmahagow and environs was published in spring 2020 and the planned local launch event was stymied by the pandemic. Earlier this year author Andrew C. Scott - a distinguished geologist/geophysicist from Royal Holloway University of London whose family have deep roots in the parish, including in Coalburn - began contacting local organisations to see about setting up a replacement.

We were delighted when Lesmahagow Library took up the baton, the book having proved popular there, hosting a 'meet the author' event on Friday 9th June. Geoff Brown was able to attend and took this picture of Mr

Scott with his book. We now have our own signed copy, with is available on loan to Heritage Society members from the Heritage Centre.



Unlike many other small villages in the UK, Lesmahagow has many claims to fame, because of its location, its cultural contributions and the distinctive legacy many of its sometime residents have conferred on the history of the nation..... As Scott discusses, some of the inhabitants of the village achieved remarkable transformative and distinguished contributions to the wider world. Andrew Scott knows of what he speaks because his family lived in the village for more than 300 years. The legacy of these people has not commonly been traced to their one single connection - that they all grew up in the same village.

Given its extraordinary legacy in the arts, the sciences and in the world of politics, Lesmahagow may well claim to be a village that changed the world.


News of the passing of long-time members Howard Johnstone and Mary Duckett arrived just as our spring 2023 newsletter was about to print. We hope that these tributes do justice to two remarkable lives.

## Howard Johnstone

23rd September 1940 - 31st May 2023

Robert Howard Johnstone was born in Lochmaben, near Dumfries, in 1940. He moved to Coalburn with his wife Marean and their children, Robert and Kate, in 1978: a blessing for which the village has a promotion which required Howard to work from Glasgow to thank.



Howard's father was a farm worker and Howard had spent his childhood at various locations in the south of Scotland, wherever work happened to take the family. Leaving school at 15, Howard soon realised that his interests lay in mechanics and he spent his working life in that field, retiring in 2005 after 33 years working for JCB. Howard also loved travel, particularly biking, and in his holidays he made trips to the USA, Amsterdam and Scandinavia as well as the north of Scotland.

In Coalburn he was widely known as 'the guy who fixes cars' and he could often be found in the garage at home, if not working on a motor vehicle then fixing a chain saw, strimmer, lawnmower or some other mechanical device. Typically Howard didn't keep such tools to himself, but used them in the service of the community - cutting grass, strimming and weeding to keep the village tidy.

Howard and Marean were also involved in various local organisations including the cubs and scouts, the horticultural society and, of course, the Jim Hamilton Heritage Society where Howard served on committee.

On retiring from paid employment Howard was by no means indolent. As well as continuing his many activities in the local community, he became involved with the Vine Trust, an international development charity which enables volunteers to provide medical, home-building and care support to communities living in severe poverty in Tanzania and Peru ([www.vinetrust.org](http://www.vinetrust.org)). One of the activities undertaken is "building individual family homes and

larger children's homes" and it was here that Howard came into his own. He travelled to Peru in 2009 and helped to build a school for deaf boys. In 2012 he made his first trip to Tanzania, as part of a work party which helped to build houses for children who had been orphaned by HIV. Typically, Howard went above and beyond - he also bought rope and taught the children and their carers how to skip, something they had never done before. Howard returned to Tanzania in 2013 and in 2014 but thereafter regulations relating to age prevented him from going back, which he would have dearly loved to have done. Instead Howard continued to support Vine Trust by fund raising.

We recognise the man we knew in this tribute from a fellow member of the Tanzanian work party: *"He was the kindest man with incredible strength. The locals called him Babu out of respect, those of us lucky enough to work alongside him will remember Babu as the leader of the gang"*.

Howard could always be relied on to help with Heritage Society activities, quietly and efficiently, with a no-nonsense approach. He radiated charm and good humour, as in our picture, taken at our Christmas dinner in December 2021. Things just won't be the same without him.

Mary Duckett

31st August 1948 - 10th June 2023



Mary was the youngest of six children, born in 1948 to coal miner James Cullen and his wife Sally. The Cullen family lived in Midfield Road, Timbertown. In 1950, when Mary was two, her father was killed, aged 38, overcome by gas while working at Kittymuirhill Mine, Stonehouse. Her mother had to go out to work to support the family but the village rallied round - while Sally was working night shift at the canteen at Auchlochan No. 9, Grace Kearney would look after Mary and her brothers and sisters until she came home in the morning.

Mary married Richard Duckett in 1970 and they had two sons, Daniel and Dax. The Duckett family lived in Larkhall, where Mary was active in the community and became a proud recipient of the British Empire Medal.

Mary never forgot her Coalburn roots. In 1988 she made contact with Jim Hamilton, seeking a copy of the 'Coalburn Chronicles', then number-

ing 41. The outcome was that Jim visited to supply copies of those that were still available, he and Mary got talking, and her reminiscences made their way into a later issue (Part 46, issued October 1988).

Mary later became a member of The Jim Hamilton Heritage Society of Coalburn and in 2007 was a guest speaker, sharing the story of her early life in the village.

More recently, prompted by the enquiry from the Commonwealth War Graves Commission (CWGC) seeking information about Coalburn men interred in Lesmahagow cemetery who are commemorated by the CWGC (Newsletter 68, Autumn 2022), Mary got in touch to say that she visited the Somme Battlefields every second year and as she would be going this May: *"If anyone is aware of anyone buried in any of cemeteries or named on any of the memorials that I will be visiting I will be happy to take photos or lay a wreath on behalf of any family."* Several of us were glad to take up this kind offer and when we last heard from Mary she was looking forward to the trip.

We were shocked to hear that Mary died suddenly at home on June 10th.




